## GOSPEL REFLECTIONS from PASTOR'S DESK

Dickson Wright was a British celebrity chef best known as one half, along with Jennifer Paterson, of the **Two Fat Ladies** cooking show. They preached the joys of cooking on a television show originating in Britain that accurately, if irreverently, described them both. The show was heavy on humor as well as calories. Avoiding popular low-fat diets, the two fat ladies sought to reclaim traditional home cooking. They themselves were the best advertisements for their recipes, which usually featured heavy doses of butter and cream. The two fat ladies are part of a growing trend to forget food deprivation and just say yes to bacon. Dietitians now argue that fat-free foods are high in sugar and calories - which explains why people on low-fat or no-fat diets get fat. Gwen Shamblin's **The Weigh Down Diet**, which advises using spirituality to avoid overeating, has already sold more than 1.2 million copies to overweight Christians. The bottom line is that people are scrambling like crazy to find the diet that is right for them. But there is another diet not many people talk about, presented in today's gospel: the "Bread of Life Diet." It's spiritually high-carb, but offers full nutritional value. Jesus says, "*I am the bread of life,*" and promises that people on his program "*will never hunger or thirst again!*" These are extravagant claims, like the kind you might find on soy milk or fat-burners. But Jesus can deliver on what he promises.

The first reading describes the physical and spiritual hungers experienced by the prophet Elijah. The bread of life Jesus speaks about is prefigured in this reading by the miraculous food by which the angel nourished Prophet Elijah in the desert while he was fleeing from the soldiers of Queen Jezebel. After being nourished by the Lord, Elijah was strengthened for the long journey of forty days to Mount Horeb where God gave to Moses the Ten Commandments.

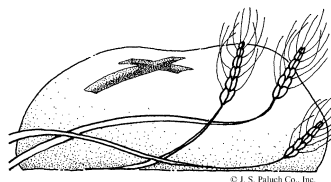
Today's gospel describes Jesus' discourse in the synagogue at Capernaum on his return after the miraculous feeding of the five thousand. During the discourse, Jesus reveals himself as the true "*bread of life that came down from heaven,*" to give life to the world. "Manna" represented God's gift rained down "from heaven" upon the Israelites to prolong their earthly life. Jesus proclaims himself as the new and perfect manna, as incarnate Son of God, literally "come down from heaven." This means that the Bread we consume in the Eucharist is more than just a guarantee that one day we'll have eternal life. It actually gives us a share of that eternal life while we are still on earth. But some of those, who had just witnessed Jesus' ability to supply them with food, turned away when he explained the source of his mysterious power and his heavenly origin.

"You are what you eat?" Jesus is bread and he wants us to eat his flesh. Thus we bring him into the core of our being. He is ready to come into our lives, regardless of

who we have been, or how unqualified we feel. Let us live the life of faith ... making changes so that he becomes the staple food of our spiritual life, not a side dish. Let us be a people who recognize that Jesus, whom we consume and assimilate into our being every day, is actually God.

Let us remember that Holy Communion a) increases our intimate union with Christ; b) preserves, increases, and renews the sanctifying grace received at Baptism; c) cleanses us from past sin and preserves us from future sins; d) strengthens the theological virtue of charity, thus enabling us to be separated from our disordered attachments and to be rooted in Christ; and e) unites us more deeply to the mystery of the Church.

I am on vacation; keep me in your prayers for good health and safe travel. I will also visit some of our Missions. Keep our missionary confreres also in your prayers.

## STRENGTHENED BY THE BREAD OF LIFE

Today we resume the “Bread of Life” discourse from John’s Gospel that began two weeks ago. He makes reference to the Jews’ ancestors who ate manna in the desert. These days we would think primarily of Israel wandering in the desert, but faithful Jews would also have known the story of Elijah that we hear today. Strengthened by food and drink in the desert, the angel of the Lord sends him on his forty-day and forty-night journey (the biblical number for a preparation time). Like the food given to Elijah in the desert, Jesus tells his listeners that he is bread for the life of the world. It is very important that we not stop listening to Jesus after his promise of eternal life—a marvelous promise, but this “reward” is not the only reason we feast on the Bread of Life. We also come to the table to be made strong for the journey of mission, that the whole world might have life in the fullness of Christ. ## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Careful readers of the “Treasures” will have noticed that the two columns about the oldest monastic communities in the United States refer to the colonial states. The Louisiana Purchase gained a great treasure for our nation, the Ursuline monastery of New Orleans. Among the greatest pioneers of that city were nuns who came from France on a perilous voyage in 1727, pestered by pirates and tossed by fearsome storms. These were genteel, well-educated Ursulines, yet their first task was to roll up their sleeves and open a hospital to care for the pestilence-ridden colony. Next, they opened a school for girls and launched a plan to educate the women being shipped over from France to marry settlers. In this way, they had enormous influence in molding patterns of family and domestic life.

At Christmastime in 1814, the threat of a British assault on the city was growing. On the terrifying night of January 7, 1815, the women of New Orleans gathered in the monastery chapel to pray that the city be spared from destruction in battle. The mother superior made a vow to have a Mass of Thanksgiving on that date every year should the Americans win. That night, Our Lady of Prompt Succor, to whom the nuns had great devotion, became the protector and patron of this great city. The convent in the French Quarter is the oldest standing building in the Mississippi valley, and the only surviving building of the French colonial period. The nuns relocated in 1824, but their old monastery is preserved as a museum and archives for the Archdiocese of New Orleans. The school the nuns began, Ursuline Academy, is the oldest continuously operating Catholic school, and school for women, in the United States.
